

# Language of the Academy

Propositions approved by the Academy.

§ 1. The language of the Academy has its vocabulary international to the highest degree, and with the least amount of grammar.

§ 2. The Academy accepts words common to the vocabularies (etymological) A. D. F. H. I. P. R.

§ 3. English words <sup>derived</sup> from Latin are nearly always F. H. I. P., and often D. and R.; <sup>there</sup> exist in commerce numerous vocabularies (excellent) of Anglo-Latin. This Academy adopts provisionally every word English word derived from Latin.

§ 4. In botany, zoology, chemistry &c., the Academy adopts nomenclature in use in science.

§ 5. The Academy prepares a vocabulary of words not defined by § 2, § 3, § 4, and of words more more frequent.

§ 6. The Academy adopts every word inter-
